Convention Highlights The convention opens on Thursday, June 13, with a Divine Service with Communion at 7:30 p.m. in the Corpus Christi Ballroom of the Omni Corpus Christi Hotel. All business sessions will be held in the Corpus Christi Ballroom. Friday's session will begin at 8:15 a.m. The final session will be held Saturday morning with the convention concluding at 12:00 p.m. The sessions will include our keynote speaker, LWML Past President Debbie Larson along with two Mites in Action speakers. Pastor Chad Bresson is serving The Table of Los Fresnos, a grant recipient from this biennium. Pastor Dave Murillo serves St. Paul Lutheran Church in San Antonio, a recipient from our prior biennium. There will be Bible Studies led by our pastoral counselors along with Wake Up with the Word on Friday morning at 7:00 a.m. Attendees will have the opportunity to attend two of the three enrichment sessions being offered. Enrichment Session leaders will be Debbie Larson, LWML Past President and keynote speaker, Kayla Winkler, member of the Christian Life Committee, and Ruth Meyer, an author and speaker who is quickly becoming one of our district's most called upon presenters.

Spring 2024 Rally News

To God, be the glory! Despite the torrential rainfall, there were 78 women in attendance. The Lutheran Women in Mission of Faith Lutheran, Georgetown, outdid themselves. The food they provided was superb, from the salads to the desserts. The decorations were fantastic, with purple and gold tablecloths and flowers. There were sweet little bags of chocolates with Romans 12:1-2 attached.

As for the ladies in attendance, a few said this was their first time. Yeah, God! Our Savior had 70% present! Praise the Lord! I was blessed to see friends that I had not seen for a while.

Our Ingathering was for Isaiah 117 House, a ministry that assists children in transitioning from home to foster care. Tara Thornton told us about children who were sleeping in the office of the Child Protective Service. She shared with us her story of how she got involved. An offering was collected to help build the House in Williamson County. Isaiah 117 comes from the scripture verse Isaiah 1:17.

Let's not forget about our guest speaker, Pastor Dr. James Marriott, Associate Pastor at Faith. The title of his presentation was "How the Redeemed World is Done: The Intersection of Christian Worship and Daily Life." He did a great job in just 30 minutes. Pastor Marriott spoke about how Christian Worship is more than just a Sunday morning service. He discussed how the Church today has become a moralistic, therapeutic Deism. He means that people attend Church to learn what is right and to feel good. But Jesus is more about the transformation of our lives. It is not about what we can do but what Jesus has done for us and in us—the good we do results from the transformation and not a means to earn our salvation. Doing good works due to the transformative relationship with Jesus Christ is a form of Christian worship. Therefore, Christian worship intersects with our daily lives, not just on Sundays.
