

In 2017 the Lutheran Women's Missionary League celebrated its 75th anniversary of serving the Lord with gladness. LWML is the official women's auxiliary of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod whose mission is to affirm each woman's relationship with the Triune God and equip and encourage women to use their gifts in active, global mission ministry. A major emphasis of the LWML is the support of mission and ministry throughout the world by means of Mite Box® offerings which have collectively funded more than one-hundred million dollars in mission grants since the organization's inception in 1942.

ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

For many years women in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod hoped, prayed, and talked about a Synod-wide League of Lutheran women. They wanted an opportunity for service in addition to that offered in the local congregation. Disappointment and discouragement came to those who in early days tried to effect such an organization. Determined though to carry on some kind of unified program, leagues were organized within their own cities and within their own Synod Districts. Actually, the Lutheran Women's Missionary League had its beginning as far back as 1929. It received the Synod's approval at the 1941 Synod Convention held at St. Stephens Church, Chicago, Illinois, July 7-8, 1942, and began to function officially January 1, 1943. At this convention Dr. J.W. Behnken, President of Synod, stated: "This is an historic event and one that Church history should record." The Lutheran Women's Missionary League is a Synod-wide organization of women's societies within the congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. Any woman who is a communicant member of a congregation may become a member of the LWML.

LWML TEXAS DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

Following the lead of the organizing districts, a group of interested Texas women and pastors held a meeting in Waco, June 26, 1941, for the purpose of discussing a possible state organization for Texas.

Approximately 125 women attended. Mrs. Walter Kramer served as chairman at this meeting, and Mrs. Delven Ressel as secretary. Steps toward organization were delayed until local societies and pastors were fully informed concerning the Lutheran Women's Missionary League. However, some time after this meeting the District President, Rev. E.A. Heckmann, acting upon Synod's suggestions, appointed a pastoral committee of three to assist in organizing a district Lutheran Women's Missionary League. The committee included Rev. J. H. Kollmeyer, Charmain, Rev. V.L. Behnken, and Rev. A. Arndt.

The committee arranged for a constitutional convention to be held at Concordia College, Austin, on June 10, 1942. This, the first meeting of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League of the Texas District was attended by 48 delegates and 166 visitors. The group conditionally adopted a constitution that required the joining of twenty congregational societies before a district organization could become operative. A delegate and an alternate were chosen to represent the Texas District at the National Convention, those being Mrs. W.H. Kieschnick of Harlingen and Mrs. Delvin Ressel of Tyler, respectively. Mrs. Ressel, alternate, attended the convention. The first district officers elected were: President, Mrs. A.E. (Hildegarde) Bruns, Houston; Vice-President, Mrs. W.D. (Anna Marie) Parker, Dallas; Secretary, Mrs. Martin (Cornelia) Ramming, Denison; Financial Secretary, Mrs. D.E. (Louise) Ressel, Tyler; and Additional Board Member, Mrs. W.G. (Alma) Buchschacher, Waco. Mrs. W.D. (Anna Marie) Parker was the first Texas District officer to attend the National Executive Committee meeting in St. Louis in October, 1942. Since the general body by direction of the Chicago Convention was to begin functioning January 1, 1943, the Texas District fell in line.

OBJECTIVES

- To develop and maintain a greater mission consciousness among the women of Synod through –

- 2. To adopt and support missions through prayer, cooperation, and financial support, especially those projects for which adequate provision has NOT been made in the Synod's program.

These objectives have been zealously carried out through projects assumed by the LWML Texas District and through activities sponsored by the Christian Growth Committee.

MEMBERSHIP

Application blanks for membership in the league and copies of the constitution were sent to all the congregations. By March 1943, 28 societies with 743 members had joined. The following list reveals Texas District growth by biennium, societies and individual membership.

Full credit goes to Mrs. A.E. (Hildegarde) Bruns, the first elected president of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, Texas District, for having organized the district into zones. Mrs. Bruns patterned the zoning after that of the circuits in Texas, dividing the state into eleven zones. Each zone was designated by number. This was reported and recorded at the convention of 1943.

In 1956 the LWML Texas District took official action to divide the state into eighteen zones. These zones were to adopt names to replace the original number designation.

The Gulf Coast Zone was further divided in May 1958 to also form the "Golden Triangle Zone." This brought the district to nineteen zones as reported to the tenth biennial convention. Reported to the eleventh convention June 1960 was an additional two zones, bringing the total to twenty-one zones. In 1962 the number of zones increased to twenty-five.

The zone count remained at twenty-five from 1962 through the convention in 1964. From 1966 through 1968 the number of zones reported to the convention was twenty-six. Between 1968 and 1970 four new zones were created bringing the zone count to thirty as reported to the convention of 1970. From 1970 until June 1976 the zone count remained consistently at thirty zones. However, by 1980 the number of zones was reported at twenty-nine, where it remained until 1985 when two zones divided making thirty-one zones. The zone count remained at thirty-one through 1998. By 2016 the LWML Texas District reported twenty-six zones.

OFFICERS

During the first three years of the existence (1942 – 1944) of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, Texas District, officers were elected at each annual convention to serve one year. However, at the 1944 convention held in San Antonio, all officers were retained to serve until the first biennial convention, making their term of office three years. In 1946 a constitutional change provided that the term of office should be two years, with the proviso that no officer might succeed herself, but might be elected to the same office at some later date. In 1954 another constitutional change provided that all officers shall be elected for two years and shall be eligible to not more than one re-election. A constitutional change in 1958 set the term of office for four years, and officers should not be eligible for re-election. The new office of Recording Secretary was created at this convention.

The pioneer officers elected at the convention held in Austin, 1942 were: President, Mrs. A.E. (Hildegarde) Bruns, Houston, who served as president for one year and as the additional Board Member for four years; Vice-President, Mrs. W.D. (Anna Marie) Parker, Dallas, one year; Secretary, Mrs. Martin (Cornelia) Ramming, Denision, one year; Financial Secretary, Mrs. D.E. (Louise) Ressel served part of her term, then resigned. Mrs. Martin (Cornelia) Ramming was appointed to complete Mrs. Ressel's term until the next convention. Additional Board Member, Mrs. W.G. (Alma) Buchschacher, Waco, served one year.

Officers elected at the second convention in Fort Worth, 1943 were: President, Mrs. W.E. (Erna) Dorre, Wichita Falls, who served until July 1944, and also served as delegate to the International Convention and resigned. Vice President, Mrs. W.C. Geisler, Fort Worth, served two years and resigned. Secretary, Mrs. W.W. (Bertha) Wortman, Waco, served until August 1944 and then resigned. Treasurer, Mrs. Lewis Human, Wichita Falls served three years. Additional Board Member was Mrs. A.E. (Hildegarde) Bruns, Houston, retiring president.

All officers continued in their terms at the third convention in San Antonio, 1944. Miss Toni Kraatz, Dallas, was appointed to complete Mrs. Dorre's unexpired term ending June 1946. During Miss Kraatz's term of office the Texas District took its first steps toward European Relief Work. Mrs. J. W. Cole, Dallas, was appointed to serve out Mrs. Wortman's unexpired term ending June 1946.

The fourth convention met in Houston, 1946. Newly elected officers were: President, Mrs. E.C. (Lillian) Kobs, Houston; Vice-President, Mrs. A.C. Dollace, Galveston; Secretary, Miss Bernice Elgin, Galveston; and Treasurer, Mrs. A.M. Peek, Houston. The Additional Board Member was Miss Toni Kraatz, Dallas, retiring president. Miss Bernice Elgin resigned April 1947. Mrs. Elton (Amelda) Sump, Houston, was appointed to succeed her as Secretary.

The fifth convention met in Vernon, 1948. Newly elected officers were: President, Mrs. A.O. (Edith) Rast, Austin; Vice-President, Mrs. W.R. (Lillian) Kramer, San Antonio; Secretary, Mrs. F. Entzenberger, San Antonio; and Treasurer, Mrs. J.W. Schindler, San Antonio. The Additional Board Member was Mrs. E.C. (Lillian) Kobs, Houston, retiring president.

The sixth convention met in Houston, 1950. Newly elected officers were: President, Mrs. Carl (Anne) Blasig, Mercedes; Vice-President, Mrs. A.H. Albers, McAllen; Secretary, Mrs. H.F. (Meta) Krusemark, McAllen; and Treasurer, Mrs. E.A. Biewener, McAllen. The Additional Board Member was Mrs. A.O. (Edith) Rast, Austin, retiring president.

The seventh convention met in Corpus Christi, 1952. Newly elected officers were: President, Mrs. W.B. (Hildegarde) Oswald, Clifton; Vice-President, Mrs. W.G. (Alma) Buchschacher, Waco; Secretary, Mrs. J.M. (Ann) Garrett, Waco; and Treasurer, Mrs. Marvin (Dorothy) Mickan, Copperas Cove. The Additional Board Member was Mrs. Carl (Anne) Blasig, Mercedes, retiring president.

The eighth convention met in Waco, 1954. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. W.B. (Hildegarde) Oswald, Clifton, re-elected; Vice-President, Mrs. W.G. (Alma) Buchschacher, Waco, re-elected; Recording Secretary, Mrs. A.E. (Lorina) Koepsell, Austin; Treasurer, Mrs. E.A. (Lillian) Kramer, San Antonio; and Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. B.A. Matthews, Hillsboro.

The ninth convention met in Brownsville, 1956. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. Walter (Marguerite) Wilkinson, Midland. Mrs. Wilkinson served until December 1956 and resigned. Mrs. Leroy (Virginia) Tschatschula succeeded to the office of President. Mrs. Lanier Bell, San Angelo, was appointed to the office of Vice-President by the Administrative Board in a special meeting in April 1957. Recording Secretary, Mrs. George (Jo) Fehl resigned in June 1957. Mrs. Walter (Helene) Hoelter, College Station, was appointed to complete Mrs. Fehl's term. Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. E. (Phyllis) Bickerstaff, San Antonio and Treasurer, Mrs. E.A. (Lillian) Kramer, San Antonio, were re-elected.

The tenth convention met in Lubbock, 1958. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. E.A. (Lillian) Kramer, San Antonio; First Vice-President, Mrs. J.M. (Dr.Ann) Garrett, Waco; Second Vice-President, Mrs. F.W. Schneider, Edna; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Walter (Helene) Hoelter, College Station, Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. E. (Phyllis) Bickerstaff, San Antonio; and Treasurer, Mrs. Ed (Evelyn) Birnbaum, Vernon. The office of Second Vice-President was inaugurated with the acceptance of the new constitution and by-laws in 1958.

The eleventh convention met in Dallas, 1960. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. J. M. (Dr.Ann) Garrett, Waco; First Vice-President, Mrs. Kenneth (Mary) Johnson, New Braunfels; and Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. W.P. (Lillian) Denman, Baytown. The twelfth convention met in San Antonio, 1962. Continuing in office were: President, Mrs. J.M. (Ann) Garrett, Waco; First Vice-President, Mrs. Kenneth (Mary) Johsnon, New Braunfels; and Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. W.P. (Lillian) Denman, Baytown.

The thirteenth convention met in Odessa, 1964. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. Walter (Gladys) Kaltwasser, Farwell; First Vice-President, Mrs. Wayne (Amalie) Long, Monahans; Second Vice-President, Mrs. Daniel (Lila Mae) Smith, Waco; and Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. W.R. (Joan) Joiner, San Angelo. Continuing in office were: Recording Secretary, Mrs. Robert (Edna) Gloyna, Pasadena, and Treasurer, Miss Toni Kraatz, Dallas.

The fourteenth convention met in Corpus Christi, 1966. Officers elected were: Second Vice-President, Mrs. Robert (Edna) Gloyna, Pasadena; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Elton (Amelda) Sump, Conroe; and Treasurer, Mrs. Wilburn (Barbara) Ussery, Plainview. Angelo. The office of corresponding secretary was discontinued by vote in the 1970 convention. The President could appoint her personal secretary to assist with correspondence.

ARCHIVIST-HISTORIAN

In order to preserve the accumulation of valuable historical documents of the Texas District Lutheran Women's Missionary League, the League created the office of Archivist at its second biennial convention held in Vernon in 1948. Mrs. E.C. (Lillian) Kobs, retiring President, Houston, was elected to serve in this capacity for two years. Since the office of archivist was not an administrative office, the third biennial convention, held in Houston, 1950, voted to make Mrs. Lillian Kobs its permanent archivist. A clause was added making Mrs. Lillian Kobs Historian and custodian of the District Lutheran Women's Missionary League Scrapbook.

At the tenth biennial convention which met in Lubbock the constitution was amended and added to greatly. One change made under Article VII – Executive Committee paragraph 3 "g" now reads: "to appoint the Historian and Archivist." Mrs. E.C. (Lillian) Kobs was reappointed after the constitution changes were adopted in 1958. When Mrs. Kobs had served the Texas District LWML as Historian-Archivist for twenty-five years, the Administrative Board voted to surprise "Lil" with an all-expense paid trip to the International Convention in Mobile, Alabama in 1973. Mrs. Kobs continued to serve as Historian-Archivist until 1984.

Following the 1984 convention in San Antonio, newly elected President, Mrs. Donald (Marcella) Gaus appointed Mrs. Martin (Elaine) Schur to the office of Archivist-Historian. She attended the Concordia Historical Conference in St. Louis in November 1985 and continued in service until 2000. Barbara Vance, Denton, was appointed to the office of Archivist-Historian and served until 2008. Dr. MaryAnn Waldon was appointed in 2008 and faithfully served as the Archivist-Historian until 2014, when Terri Wenzel was appointed to the position.

COUNSELORS

A tremendous amount of credit for the time, interest and work expended on behalf of the officers of the newly organized LWML Texas District goes to Rev. E. A. Heckmann, Waco, past President of the Texas Synodical District. He appointed the counselors, Rev. V.L. Behnken, Rev. A. Arndt and Rev. J.H. Kollmeyer, who were to guide the League in its infancy. Rev. Kollmeyer served as Counselor from 1942-1950. At the biennial convention held in Vernon in 1948, it was decided that the district needed two counselors. One was to continue in the position, and a new one elected at each convention.

DISTRICT NEWS

The District News, official publication of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, Texas District, had its inception at the Fort Worth Convention in 1943. Mrs. O.J. Ronecker of San Antonio was the first editor and served until December 1943, when she resigned. Mrs. W.E. (Erna) Dorre of Fort Worth filled in until Mrs. Fred Neuman of Houston took over in May 1944. Mrs. Neuman served until November 1944. Mrs. Dorre again supplied the January 1945 issue. Mrs. H.A. Burandt of Dallas was editor from March 1945 to September 1945. She was instrumental in changing the District News from a mimeographed bulletin to booklet form. Mrs. R. Martin of Temple served as editor from November 1945 until July 1946. Mrs. W.E. (Erna) Dorre served again until September 1946. Then Mrs. R. Martin resumed duties as editor until September 1950. Mrs. P.H. Pralle, Alamo, became editor in 1950, served until the convention in 1952, was reappointed for another two years, and resigned in April 1953. Mrs. Edna Dautenhahn, Robertson, was appointed to succeed Mrs. Pralle as editor in June 1953, and served until June 1956. Mrs. Orville A. Buntrock, Lubbock, accepted the appointment as editor in September 1956. Mrs. Buntrock served until her resignation in June 1958. Mrs. E.R. Rathgeber, Vernon, served from June 1959 to June 1962. Mrs. A.O. (Edith) Rast, Austin, served from 1962 to June 1966. Mrs. Harry (Virginia) Sletner, Harlingen, served from June 1966 to June 1970. Mrs. J. (Helen) Konz, Marlin, served from 1970 until the end of 1974. It was during her term in office that the Official Publication of the Texas District was discontinued, and by vote of the convention of 1970 became incorporated with the Texas Messenger and now reaches the LWML membership through the Lutheran Witness. At the 1974 Convention, Mrs. Brad (Dot) Kohr, Dallas, was appointed editor and served until resigning in May 1977, moving out of the district. Mrs. H. Earl (Margaret) Goodson, Houston was appointed editor May 1977 and served until June 1984. Mrs. William (Dolores) Bruncke, Plano, was appointed editor in June 1984 and served until June 1989, Mrs. James (Shirley) Baumgartner, San Antonio, was appointed editor in June 1989 and served until June 1992. Mrs. Charlotte Hughes, Flower Mound, was appointed editor in June 1992 and served until June 1996. Mrs. Rudy (Dorothy) Hunger, Rockwall, was appointed editor in June 1996 and served until 2000. The following editors were: Ann Schueler, Winchester, 2000-2002; Teresa Mesman, Farwell, 2002-2006; Kelly Hamilton, Port Arthur, 2006-2010; Laura Wilson, Groves, 2010-2014; and Debbie Curry, Oakwood, 2014-2016. Janna Atkins, Abilene, was appointed in 2016.

LUTHERAN WOMEN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE INTERNATIONAL CONVENTIONS A FIRST FOR THE TEXAS DISTRICT

The 1965 International Convention voting body selected Houston, Texas as the location for the 1969 International Convention.

The Texas District Lutheran Women's Missionary League asked Mrs. Edward R. Rathgeber to be chairman for this convention. Mrs. Rathgeber met the same year with International President, Mrs. Warren Hartman to formulate plans and to choose committee chairmen. A motto "Thrust with Trust" was selected because it seemed to fit in the age of space exploration. Convention headquarters was the Rice Hotel, Houston.

Three thousand persons attended the opening service which was held in the Albert Thomas Space Hall. There were 1481 guests, eighty-one pastors, fifty-four directors, and 538 voting delegates. Liturgists for this service were Rev. Andres Sabo and Rev. Harold Heckmann. The preacher was Dr. Carl Heckmann, President of Texas District, Missouri Synod who spoke on "Free to be Free" based on the text Romans 6:19-23.

The delegates received an added bonus when they were able to witness live television coverage of man's first exploration of the moon's surface.

Delegates also witnessed another "first" when Mrs. Oscar Feucht, International LWML secretary for twenty-three years, was presented with a life membership pin, a check for \$3,500 and bouquet of yellow roses.

Three International Past Presidents were recognized: Mrs. Arthur Preisinger, Mrs. Walter Hoppe, and Mrs. Gilbert Hankel. Mrs. Warren Hartman, President of International, presented two visiting dignitaries, Mrs. C.O. Leonard (ALC) and Mrs. William Matz (LCA) to the convention body.

The Convention was addressed by the retiring president of Synod, Dr. Oliver R. Harms, and by the newly elected President, Dr. J.A.O. Preuss. Condensed forms of the addresses of all convention speakers can be found in the September-October 1969 issue of the *District News*.

Tours were offered to Astro World, Domed Stadium and other places of interest. Fifteen hundred persons attended a rodeo and barbecue on Circle B Ranch. A post-convention tour was arranged to Mexico City.

SECOND CONVENTION FOR THE TEXAS DISTRICT

The Texas District hosted the International LWML Convention in Fort Worth at the Tarrant County Convention Center in June 1987 with the theme "Radiant With God's Love." Dr. Glenn O'Shoney preached on the topic "Cleaving the Darkness" at the convention opening communion service. Rev. Dennis Glick led the convention Bible study. Convention guest speakers included Dr. Ralph Bohlmann, Marie Meyer, Dr. Edward Westcott, Jr., Dr. Shirley Bergman, and Rev. Carl Robinson.

More than 4,800 people attended the convention, including 654 delegates. Convention offerings benefited the LWML mission goal (\$15,883), Hope Lutheran Church, Salt Lake City, UT (\$12,998), Togo Medical clinics (\$12,994), and a van for Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Vancouver, BC (\$10,664). A mission goal of \$1,000,000 was adopted at convention.

Four LWML Discipling Women representatives were commissioned for a trip to England. Convention attendees viewed the premiere showing of a LCMS mission field film funded by LWML, "Salifu's Harvest," with a surprise visit by Nicholas Salifu of Ghana at its conclusion.

At the Texas Caucus, Mrs. Mark (Pearl) Biar was presented a stained-glass wall hanging by Dr. Ray Martens of Concordia College recognizing her as "Lutheran Woman of the Year" for 1987. Pearl had served her

district as First Vice-President, President, and as the 1987 International Convention Chairman. Two Texas LWML members were elected to International Offices. Mrs. Mark (Pearl) Biar was elected First Vice-President of Mission Service, and Mrs. Wesley (Puddin') Krueger was elected Financial Secretary. Following the convention, Mrs. H. Earl (Margaret) Goodson was appointed chairman of Mission Service. Other Texans appointed to committees were: Mrs. Robert (Catherine) Burkhard to Bylaws, Mrs. Rufus (Ruby) Young and Mrs. Steve (Roselyn) Henze to Member Development, and Mrs. William (Dolores) Bruncke as Assistant Editor of the LWML Quarterly.

CHRISTIAN GROWTH IN THE LWML TEXAS DISTRICT

At the 1953 International LWML Convention, Portland, Oregon, a resolution was passed to give full support to Synod's intensive effort in the field of "Lay Training." Permission was granted the California-Nevada District in 1954 to hold the first guidance or "test" institute which was to serve as a pattern for nine other sections of the U.S.

The International Christian Growth Committee held a regional Institute in Austin, May 1955. The topics were "Deepening the Inter Spiritual Life," "Personal Evangelism," and "Training Kingdom Workers." These topics were also the objectives of the Christian Growth Program. Mrs. A.O. (Edith) Rast was Chairman 1955 to 1957, before resigning. Mrs. Edmund (Luella) Pliefke succeeded her in the office and served from July 1957 to June 1962. As a result of this institute, Bible Study Groups had their inception at St. Paul's, San Antonio, with Dr. Roland Wiederaenders as organizer. This supported Synod's "Lay Training Effort."

Mrs. Louella Pliefke attended the first International Christian Growth Workshop in Minneapolis in July 1957. Each district was urged to write a topic relative to the objectives of the LWML since very few topics existed at the time. Five districts, including Texas, were chosen to present their topics at the workshop. Louella wrote her own topic, "Growing in Christ," and presented it with flip chart illustrations.

In 1959, Mrs. Robert Dutton, San Antonio, became a co-chairman with Mrs. Pliefke, and Rev. Charles Keturakat, San Antonio, became Pastoral Counselor for the committee serving until 1959 when Rev. Eric Wagner became the Pastoral Counselor.

Mrs. Pliefke attended the International Workshop in Toronto, Canada in 1959. In 1960 the first Texas District Christian Growth Workshop was held in Dallas with a representation from all 30 zones, in addition to pastors and guests. In 1962 the second District Workshop was held in San Antonio prior to the convention. After this convention, Mrs. Robert (Kathryn) Dutton became the chairman.

The Christian Growth effort, as far as "Lay Training" was concerned, was planned and executed solely by the Christian Growth Chairmen and their committees from 1955 to 1964, when Article V, Section 3 of our Bylaws, under duties of the Second Vice-President, a new part "c" - Serve as Chairman of the Christian Growth Committee was inserted.

International established a Leadership Training Committee in 1970 with Mrs. Walter (Helen) Gienapp of Michigan as Chairman. Texas sent two representatives, Mrs. Robert (Catherine) Burkhard of Dallas, and Mrs. Earl (Mildred) Teufel of Port Arthur, to the Leadership Training Program in Salt Lake City, Utah. During 1971-1972 these ladies helped to implement this program in the Texas District.

Texas District was divided into seven Christian Growth Regional Districts. The theme chosen for the 1976-1978 biennium was "Walking with My Lord." Rev. Edwin Pieplow, Fort Worth, graciously consented to render his outstanding ability as speaker at these programs. Christian Growth Chairman, Mrs. William (Ruth) Bredemeyer, Channelview, reported over 800 persons attended the Regional Workshops during the biennium.

Christian Growth Chairman, Mrs. Ray (Edna) Peterson, Houston, attended the Pilot Workshop for "Seminar '80" in St. Louis in September 1979. Mrs. Peterson and her committee successfully sponsored the "You are God's Gift" Seminar. It preceded the convention in Tyler with 342 in attendance. The same committee presented the "JOY" Workshop preceding the convention in Corpus Christi in 1982 with over 600 in attendance.

Christian Growth Chairman, Ms. Gretchen Sump, Austin, attended the pilot seminar on "Strengthening the Christian Woman" in St. Louis in 1982. Ms. Sump and her committee presented the "Strengthening the Christian Woman" Workshop preceding the convention in San Antonio in 1984 with 607 attending. This same committee presented the "Linked by Love" Workshop preceding the convention in Lubbock in June 1986 with 454 in attendance. Alma Kern, author of the book, "You Are Special," was the keynote speaker.

Christian Growth Chairman, Mrs. Ronald (Sherry) Torbert and her committee presented the workshop "Turn Your Eyes upon Jesus" preceding the convention in Galveston on June 22, 1988 with 615 in attendance. This same committee planned the workshop "The Discipling Woman" for June 19-20, 1990 in Austin. Outstanding key speakers were Rev. Erwin L. Kolb of St. Louis and Mrs. Jean Prochnow. There were 720 in attendance.

The Christian Growth Workshop "Celebrate God's Love – He's My Savior" was planned by Mrs. James (Iris) Franke and her committee. Special speakers were Rev. Leroy and Mrs. Marie Biesenthal of St. Louis. There were 748 in attendance on June 19, 1992 in Houston. Sessions leaders were from the Houston area. This same committee planned the workshop "Empowered by His Love" with approximately 600 in attendance on June 15, 1994 in Wichita Falls. Sessions leaders were district officers, former officers, and other ladies in the district.

Christian Growth Chairman, Mrs. Robert (Eloise) Kuhlmann and her committee planned the workshop "Refreshed by His Word through the Seasons of Life." Rev. Francis Schroeder presented the Bible study. There were 781 in attendance on June 28, 1996 in College Station. This would be the last Christian Growth Workshop held the day preceding a convention.

Mrs. Robert (Eloise) Kuhlmann, Second Vice-President for Mission Inspiration, and her committee coordinated the Bible studies and responses with the convention business in Corpus Christi in June 1998. Leaders were Rev. Francis Schroeder, Rev. Kim DeVries, Rev. Dr. Gerald Kieschnick, Rev. Larry Krueger, and ILWML committee members Naomi Schilling and Karol Selle. The committee also planned the Spiritual Enrichment sessions held on Saturday afternoon that featured hands-on mission service and mission involvement.

The last Christian Growth workshop held on a Friday at convention was in College Station in 1996. With the 1998 convention in Corpus Christi, LWML Texas District began offering Saturday afternoon Spiritual Enrichment Breakout Sessions. At the convention held in Midland in 2002, with adoption of revised Texas District LWML Bylaws, Christian Growth was changed to Christian Life to conform to the revised national LWML Bylaws.

SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT FUND

The Scholarship Endowment Fund was established at the 1990 Convention to commemorate fifty years of blessings bestowed upon LWML Texas District. The goal was to have \$50,000 by the 1992 convention. Scholarships are granted to women from Texas training for fulltime church work at Synodical-approved colleges. Recipients received the awarded amount, half each semester.

75th ANNIVERSARY CAMPAIGN

Endowing Tomorrow's Lutheran Women in Mission Goal: \$1,000,000

The Texas District LWML launched the 75th Anniversary Campaign in the spring of 2003 to raise \$1,000,000 in estate and planned giving commitments by 2017 to benefit the two LWML Endowments – the Scholarship Endowment and the Mission Inreach Endowment. The Scholarship Endowment provides scholarships to Texas District women entering colleges of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod to prepare for full-time church vocations. The Mission Inreach Endowment provides spiritual enrichment, member development and leadership training opportunities for members of the LMWL in Texas. Both are necessary to help ensure the future of LWML in Texas. As of June 2016, the 75th Anniversary Endowment had received 151 planned giving commitments totaling \$606, 268. In addition, \$8,622.48 had been given in cash gifts.

LWML Texas District Mission Inreach Endowment – History of Interest Use

The Mission Inreach Endowment was established at the 1998 LWML Texas District Convention in Corpus Christi in partnership with Lutheran Foundation of Texas. The interest was to be used for spiritual enrichment, member development and leadership training opportunities for members of the LWML Texas District as decided by the Executive Committee.
