Creating a network of hope

riving Hope of Texas serves the poor and elderly in Central Texas and provides them transportation for doctor appointments. Driving Hope provides 200 to 300 rides each month for a growing list of more than 125 patients, many of whom require multiple treatments each week. With demand increasing, there are days when Driving Hope must turn people down.

If someone cannot find a ride to a doctor's office on a Friday, chances are they won't make it to church on Sunday. As such, riders like to discuss their spiritual struggles with their driver or the dispatcher, often revealing their struggles with hopelessness and abandonment, or the challenges of keeping their personal affairs in order.

The purpose of the Texas District mission grant, *Creating a Network of Hope — Driving Hope of Texas*, is to facilitate a natural continuum

of care between riders and congregations located in the towns where these patients live. Driving Hope wants these riders to experience the expression of God's love best found in a church community.

One network congregation is already providing care bags containing water, snacks and devotionals. Others help provide ride vouchers for patients who do not get transportation assistance from government programs. Participants in one congregation responded to a sight-impaired rider's request for help in cleaning up around her home. Most importantly, network participants are responding to riders' specific requests for prayers.

Driving Hope gathers riders' requests and passes them along to church leaders and through the Echo Prayer smartphone app. Future displays in churches will help serve as a constant reminder of the battles our neighbors are fighting. Driving Hope aims to identify ambassadors in these churches who will help facilitate connections with willing caregivers. Through

a network partnership, a patient's non-transportation needs will be met by disciples who reflect the heart of God (Matt. 26:34-39).

An average of 300,000 quilts are lovingly distributed worldwide each year by LWR. Texas is a big part of that outpouring. This past November, the LWML Texas District held ingatherings in Marion (near San Antonio), Houston and Plano. Donations came in from all over the state and even from Louisiana. Four semi-trucks were filled and took the items to LWR warehouses.

Janel Johnson-Momanyi says this about her sisters in Christ in Texas: "On Sept. 16, 2019, I became the Quilt and Kit Ministry manager at Lutheran World Relief. During orientation I heard several stories about how the Texas ingatherings are the largest in the country and

the Maryland warehouse looks forward to unloading the trucks filled to the brim with quilts and kits. Four months later in January 2020, we learned that there was a very contagious virus circulating.

"Two months later, we were canceling ingatherings. In June 2020, Marion became the location to host a pioneer ingathering in a brandnew way! By November, Marion, Houston and Plano were all back in operation and in November 2021 the magic happened again.
