This mission grant will assist pastors, ministry workers, and spouses in attending a retreat in Arizona.

But sometimes, Lord, Your shepherds can be burdened with overwhelming stress, depression, compassion fatigue, or burnout. Sometimes those who comfort and encourage need comfort and encouragement. Bless these mites used to support the ministry of Shepherd's Canyon Retreat and the scholarships that provide financial assistance for pastors, ministry workers, and spouses, to attend a week-long retreat to receive much needed counseling, hope, and healing. National Mission Grant Paid in Full

Orphan Grain Train Servant Center --- \$100,000.00

The original facility in Norfolk, Nebraska, is outdated and lacking adequate space to carry out their expanding work. They need to build an additional facility to increase their mission capacity and increase the safety level for volunteers. With an increased work area, larger groups of volunteers can work on donations received and the output of mercy meals can double to 10,000,000 meals annually. This grant will help OGT complete their building project.

4. Our next HC Planning meeting will be Zoom on June 5, 2025.



Evangelism: What Does This Mean?

Evangelism. Just the word can stir up images in our minds—perhaps of someone going door to door with a Bible tract in hand, or standing on a street corner with a Bible and a bullhorn. For some, it may even bring a feeling of anxiety, as if evangelism is a task for only the boldest and most extroverted among us.

But dear sisters in Christ, let me invite you to pause and ask that good old Lutheran question: *What does this mean?* What is evangelism, really? And how does it take shape in the everyday life of a faithful woman of God? At its core, evangelism means sharing the Good News—the Gospel—of Jesus Christ. It is proclaiming that the Son of God took on flesh, lived among us, died for the sins of the world, and rose again, bringing life and salvation to all who believe. This is the heartbeat of our faith, and it is *too good not to share*.

But how we share it? That's where we often get tripped up.

I don't believe that evangelism is necessarily about knocking on a stranger's door. That can be a version of evangelism, yes—but it's not the only one. And it's not even the most effective one for many of us.

I believe that the most powerful, most faithful kind of evangelism happens through *relationships*.

You see, evangelism is not first about technique or strategy. It's about love. It's about presence. It's about being the kind of friend, neighbor, co-worker, or family member who listens, cares, and lives in such a way that the light of Christ cannot help but shine through.

Jesus Himself often evangelized through relationships. He sat at tables. He walked along roads. He entered people's homes. He listened to their stories, met them where they were, and brought the hope of God's kingdom into their lives.

And you, dear women of the LWML, are already doing this.

Every time you care for a neighbor in need ... every time you bring a meal, send a card, pray with a friend, or invite someone to church ... every time you show up with love, speak with grace, and live with hope—you are bearing witness to Jesus. That's evangelism.

To evangelize doesn't mean you need a seminary degree or a soapbox. It means you know our Savior—and you're willing to be used by Him, wherever He's placed you.

So *what does this mean?*

It means you don't need to be anyone but yourself—a redeemed daughter of the King. It means trusting that God has given you relationships not by accident, but on purpose. And it means living each day ready to give a reason for the hope that is in you, with gentleness and respect (1 Peter 3:15).

Evangelism isn't something we do apart from our lives—it's something we *live* through our lives. And in the hands of our gracious God, your life—your words, your love, your witness—can be the very means by which another person meets Jesus.

May the Lord bless you and keep you as you live and share the Gospel, one relationship at a time.
